Eligibility:

Qualified students will be granted an award based on academic merit, SAT score, a minimum of 200 community service hours, essay, interview, and 3 letters of recommendation—2 validating community service, 1 validating character and leadership. **Please see Eligibility requirements.**

Amount of Award:

The amount of the award to any recipient shall be \$1000 -\$2500. The award will be given to the recipient directly, in one sum. The scholarship will be awarded upon eligibility criteria, graduating high school, showing targeted school's bursar receipt of enrollment and registration of courses for the 2012 Fall Term.

Selection for Award:

The selection of an applicant for a scholarship is within the discretion and guidelines as set forth by the AACEA INC Scholarship Committee. The amount and number of awards will depend upon amount of funds and endowment available.

How to Apply:

Qualified students meeting the eligibility requirements should apply. Obtain an application by doing any one of the following:

Applicants will then follow the directions provided. **APPLICATION DEADLINE: Received by Tuesday, May 1, 2012**

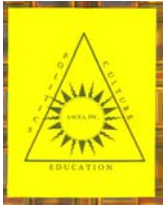

Requirements of AACEAINC Scholarship Eligibility**

***This scholarship is based on outstanding academic achievement and community service (200 minimum service hours). Only Eligible High School Students Should Apply.**

Eligibility

- Deadline: Tuesday, May 1, 2012--Application must be received on or before May 1. Any postmarked application will not be accepted but discarded.
- 90 average, suggested minimum, in the five academic subject areas that follow. (The Scholarship Committee may evaluate a lesser grade point average based on academic record, exemplary community service, letters of recommendation, courses in progress, resume, and other appropriate factors relevant to eligibility).
- 4 years of college preparatory courses in these 5 academic subject areas: 1) Mathematics—for example: Algebra, Intermediate Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry, Calculus; 2) English Language Arts; 3) Science courses (with Lab requisites) for example: General Science, Earth Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics; 4) Social Studies; and 5) Foreign Language (this is a four year sequence; not two years of one language and two years of another, or any combination of a language, etc.). Honors and Advanced Placement courses are welcome but optional.
- SAT score 1790, suggested minimum. Applicant will provide copy of official report that was sent from College Board with full composite of verbal, math, and writing scores. Unacceptable are school reports or any deviations thereof. (The Scholarship Committee may evaluate a lesser SAT score based on academic record, exemplary community service, letters of recommendation, courses in progress, resume, and other appropriate factors relevant to eligibility).
- 200 Community Service Hours, minimum, performed during high school tenure. Service hours must be validated with 2 letters of recommendation (as part of the 3 letters required).
- Preferred that applicants have given community service in the field of the designated scholarship during the course of their high school tenure; however, earned community service hours of 200 or more are acceptable.
- Proof of college acceptance with letter from targeted school to be attended August/September 2012 (failure to graduate will forfeit scholarship), copy of paid bursar receipt and fall registration of courses or enrollment certification, obtained from Registrar's Office of targeted school.
- U.S. Citizen of African American or Caribbean Heritage
- LETTERS OF SUPPORT: Please read carefully, this information will greatly affect weight of candidate's application and assessment by scholarship committee. 3 letters of recommendation – *One (1) letter is preferred from chosen field of study related to scholarship or from school faculty member. This letter attests to applicant's leadership, level of commitment, and moral fiber.*
Examples of letters from chosen field or provider: Candidate's School; Hospital Administrator, Doctor, Registered Nurse, Health Teacher, Director of Health Facility or Health Science Program; Library Director, English Language Arts Principal/Assistant Principal or English Language Arts Teacher; Aviation Program Director, Aviation School, Aviation Teacher, Math or Science Principal/Assistant Principal/ Teacher
Two (2) letters from community service organization or provider where applicant completed service hours. These letters attest to candidate's period of service, number of hours earned, description of service performed, candidate's quality of service, and any information recommender believes to be pertinent about applicant.
No relatives may submit a letter of recommendation. All letters of recommendation must be provided on organization letterhead with title of writer.
- Proof of Birth/Naturalization with copy of official certificate and copy of official Social Security Card. Applicant must present copies of these documents at time of personal interview, if selected for interview.
- Applicants must sign a promissory note to "Pass It On" and help others along life's road at time of interview, if selected for interview.
- Personal Interview with Scholarship Committee in New York, if selected for interview.
- Scholarships are not limited to New York State residents; however, all candidates must be available to sit for personal interview, with no additional costs to AACEAINC; and if awarded, physically present to receive award at banquet ceremony or forfeit scholarship. Students may use scholarship at any Accredited College or University.

BIOGRAPHY

Mildred Collins was born in St. Kitts. She received an excellent education and her mother instilled in her that she must always share and help others. She joined the Girl Guides in 1931 where she practiced what her mother had taught. Because of her great desire to help the sick, she joined the Red Cross. There she learned how to care for the infirmed and derived from this experience her niche in life. Her love for academics began at the Basseterre Girls' school where she excelled and demonstrated, early on, her scholarship and brilliance. Ms. Collins' love for service started her on the way to an outstanding Nursing Career in 1942 when she began her official training at the Cunningham Hospital, now renamed the Joseph N. Frances General Hospital. She would continue her studies obtaining the General Midwife Certificate from the Central Midwives Board of England. With grounded nursing credentials she began her career at the Basseterre Sugar Factory Medical Center where she was the Nurse in charge from 1948-1957. In 1957 she was granted the Obstetrical Nursing and Public Health "Scholarship" at the International Cooperation Administration of Puerto Rico. To answer the call of a nurse's shortage, she moved to St. Thomas, United States Virgin Islands to lend support. Her work and dedication to patients afforded her the House Supervisor position at the Knud-Hansen Memorial Hospital where she went on to become the Acting Head Nurse on the Medical Surgical Unit. Having received letters of meritorious service, she came to New York in 1959 with impeccable nursing credentials. She passed the New York State Board, received her license as a Registered Nurse by the New York State Education Department, and joined the staff of the prestigious New York Hospital-Cornell University Medical College; and she became a nurse specialist in obstetrical, gynecological, medical, and urological surgery. Ms. Collins never forgot her roots, where she came from, or her homeland. Working tirelessly, she earned extra hours to purchase modern medical equipment that was used at New York Hospital so that she could send such equipment to her native Cunningham Hospital in St. Kitts. She also purchased suction machinery for stomach operations and standby blood pressure equipment and her appreciative patients at New York Hospital went on to donate equipment in her name. For the 50th Anniversary of Girl Guides in 1981, she personally donated toys to the organization and sponsored many food drives. Over the years she has helped St. Croix and St. Kitts by returning home to nurse senior citizens in their last days and young children in need of pediatric care. In her later years, Ms. Collins has become a community activist championing community and education causes. She has been chronicled in the New York Times, the Daily News, the Times/Ledger, and the Laurelton Times. In 2006 she was the recipient of the "Senior of the Year" award (Councilman James Sanders) and the "Community Activist Award" (Elmer H. Blackburne Democratic Club). She was honored by the National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc. in 1996 and holds numerous awards for meritorious service from New York Hospital. She belongs to various community based organizations that advocate for education and her desire to nurture small children inspired AACEAINC's Adopt a School Program. Ms. Collins advocates for improved hospital and health care, veterans' rights, transportation and zoning issues and the beautification of the community. She is the Secretary of Record of the African-American/Caribbean Education Association (AACEAINC) and a Christian woman always willing to help somebody. Dedicated to the principles of service she continues, today, to give of herself willingly and selflessly.

Biography

William Samber, Sr. had roots emanating from Key West, Florida where he attended Frederick Douglas Elementary School. An apt pupil eager to be at the head of his class, even in these early years, he adhered to his mother's educational values to learn; and he was determined to reach his full potential. Raised in the church and cherishing his mother's Christian teachings, service to others was instilled in him. Early on, he strived for excellence and was desirous of making a difference. In 1933 the family moved to New York City where he attended James Fenimore Junior High School. Striving to be all that he could be and living up to his mother's expectations, he graduated as the Class Salutatorian. As a DeWitt Clinton High School student, he excelled in all his subjects but was a master of mathematics making perfect scores on Mathematics Regents Examinations. His dedication to the needy found him majoring in Sociology at the City College of New York, where he earned his first college baccalaureate degree in 1942. But something happened in the interim of his pursuit for higher education, along came the War. He volunteered for the United States Army Air Force and scored 100% on the Air Force Entrance exam. He was sent to Tuskegee Army Air Field in Alabama and became one of the "Original" Tuskegee Airmen who served in the Mediterranean Theater of Operations during World War II. To help enlisted men taking correspondence courses while in combat, he taught mathematics and other courses to them so that they could complete requirements to receive their high school diplomas. He later went on to continue his education at the State University of New York, which helped him start his education career as a teacher at George Westinghouse High School. He later went on to fulfill all requirements to become an administrator. He served as an Assistant Principal at Halsey Jr. High School and later became Principal at Roland Hayes Intermediate School 291. A brilliant scholar, Mr. Samber earned a Masters degree from Queens College in Guidance Counseling and a Masters degree in Educational Administration from Columbia University. He also earned a Professional Diploma from Fordham University and a \$5,000 scholarship to conduct a special training group in technology and open classrooms. Over the years Mr. Samber tirelessly tutored high school students who failed algebra and plane geometry; trained paraprofessionals to work effectively with math teachers; and was the Institutional Representative of Boy Scout Troop 422 at the Calvary AME Zion Church. On March 29, 2007, William Samber, Sr. was honored for his heroism and bravery as an "Original" Tuskegee Airman receiving the Congressional Gold Medal of Honor at the Nation's Capitol. He served as Education Captain to ACEAINC inculcating the importance of service and leadership. Until the time of his passing in November 2011, two weeks short of his 93rd birthday, he remained active and faithfully spoke to young people at schools, churches, civics, and CBOs advocating the pursuit of excellence and service to the community. He was a man of distinction featured in newspaper articles, television programs, and the recipient of various honors from the community, Greater Allen AME Church, York College and Dowling College. However, his greatest reward was in knowing that he had helped somebody along life's road to a better tomorrow.

Biography

Honorable Ernestine Washington has said, "I am a child of my small, rural Gullah village background which I credit being as great a part of my up-bringing as my parents, school and church." In her small village of Sol Legare, James Island in the County of Charleston, S.C., everyone was family. The community practice of loving and caring for each other instilled in me, character, a commitment of caring and serving unselfishly. She attended public schools where she stayed on the Honor Roll and was inducted into the National Honor Society. A bright young scholar, she won a full four year scholarship to South Carolina State College in Orangeburg and graduated in 1954. Her brilliance brought her to New York where she was accepted at the prestigious Columbia University and earned an MS degree in Library Science. Her desire to return home fell short when she experienced unusual racial practices bringing her back to New York. Her enthusiasm and exemplary work awarded her the position of Branch Manager (Supervisory Librarian) becoming the "first" African-American to achieve this level in the Queens Borough Library System, as well as, the first Children's Librarian. She was responsible for overall supervision of staff, community relations, internal operations of the agency, budget, books, programs and services, and material needs of the community. She also worked in the New York City school system where she was responsible for teaching classes in library use and research, outlining expenditures on various types of materials, and writing proposals for federal funding. To her credit, the RIF (Reaching Is Fundamental) proposal was successfully awarded to her school. Her work would continue through the years and she became known as the Honorable Ernestine Washington as a result of her community activism and work on Community School Board 29, where she was overwhelmingly elected. She was the co-founder of the Laurelton Theatre of Performing Arts and the Black Librarians Caucus of New York. She presently serves as Chair of Social Concern, as Officer of Top Ladies of Distinction, Queens Empire Chapter, as Officer of the St. Albans Human Resource Center Headstart Board of Directors; and she is a member of various community organizations. She was a champion against the Multiplex Theater planned for the Springfield Gardens community and involved with Queens educators that gave students shares of common stock. She has been recognized for her exemplary service to the community by the Metro Eagles' Sports Club, the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Veterans Administration Hospital Montrose, New York, and recognized by Dr. Leroy T. Walker, President of the U.S. Olympic Committee for supporting America's Olympic athletes at the Centennial Olympic Games. Honorable Ernestine Washington serves as the Education and Politics Chair of the African-American/Caribbean Education Association. A woman of great warmth and selflessness, she lives and practices these words everyday: "It's a great pleasure serving the people of Queens and wherever I can be of service".
